Commemoration of the Day:

Saint Gregory Palamas, Archbishop of Thessalonica, was born in the year 1296 in Constantinople. Endowed with fine abilities and great diligence, Gregory mastered all the subjects which then comprised the full course of medieval higher education. Gregory, barely twenty years old, withdrew to Mount Athos in the year 1316 and became a novice in the Vatopedi monastery where he was tonsured and began on the path of asceticism. There he studied under Elder St. Nikodemos and Elder Nikephoros. After their death's, Gregory transferred to the Lavra of Saint Athanasius. Here he resettled in the small skete of Glossia, and the head of this monastery began to teach the young man the method of unceasing prayer and mental activity, which had been cultivated by monastics. During his stay at Glossia the future hierarch Gregory became fully embued with the spirit of hesychasm and adopted it as an essential part of his life. In the year 1326, because of the threat of Turkish invasions, he and the brethren retreated to Thessalonica, where he was then ordained to the holy priesthood. Five days of the week he spent in silence and prayer, and only on Saturday and Sunday did he come out to his people. He celebrated divine services and preached sermons.

In the 1330s events took place in the life of the Eastern Church which put Saint Gregory among the most significant universal apologists of Orthodoxy, and brought him great renown as a teacher of hesvchasm. In 1331 the saint withdrew to Mt. Athos and lived in solitude at the skete of Saint Sayva, near the Lavra of Saint Athanasius. In 1333 he was appointed Igumen of the Esphigmenou monastery in the northern part of the Holy Mountain. It was during this period that the learned monk Barlaam came to the East from Calabria in Italy and argued against Hesychasm and the idea that a person could through prayer know come to know God. He went so far as to assert that the Light of Tabor, the Holy Transfiguration, was itself created light and only thus knowable. Saint Gregory, at the request of the Athonite monks, replied writing the "Triads in Defense of the Holy Hesychasts" in 1338. At the Constantinople Council of 1341 in the church of Hagia Sophia Saint Gregory Palamas debated with Barlaam, focusing upon the nature of the light of Mount Tabor. The Council accepted the position of Saint Gregory Palamas, that God, unapproachable in His Essence, reveals Himself through His energies, which are directed towards the world and are able to be perceived, like the light of Tabor, but which are neither material nor created. Political support for Barlaam would carry on throughout the next decade and see the great saint arrested and imprisoned for four years on charges of being the cause of disturbance and disorder in the Church. He would finally be released in 1347 and consecrated Archbishop of Thessalonica. In 1351 the Council of Blachernae solemnly upheld the Orthodoxy of his teachings.

Saint Gregory Palamas fell asleep in the Lord on November 14, 1359 and was canonized in 1368, only nine years after.


